Principles of Agriculture - Freshman

Principles of Agriculture is a class where you learn a wide range of topics from FFA(Future Farmers of America), Plant Science, Agribusiness, Veterinary Studies, and much more. This class is the starting point for incoming freshman where you decide which pathway you would like choose. The class is taught by Ms. Rompf who has a deep sense of pride and love for the agricultural industry and teaching.





Horticulture - Sophomore


Practicum Science - Senior
